




Figure 2 shows the main analytical laboratory, the central focus of the Cardio-pulmonary Unit which functions both as a diagnostic and a research organization.



ADDITIONS AND SUBTRACTIONS

On the minus side we regret very much to announce that Dr. Alvin P. Shapiro, Assistant Professor of Medicine, has resigned to take a position in the Department of Internal Medicine at the University of Pittsburgh. It's a well deserved step up and we're proud of it, but we regret to see Dr. Shapiro go.

Another significant loss is the resignation of Dr. James E. McCrainie, Associate Professor and Acting Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry. Dr. McCranie goes to The University of Georgia as Professor of Psychiatry. He has performed a good job here in a rather difficult position and we shall miss his sound advice and genial company. But, again, it's very gratifying to see our friends take the academic elevator up.

From a Fellowship in association with Dr. Dwight E. Harken comes Hugh E. Wilson, (M. D., University of Michigan School of Medicine) to carry on work in Cardiac and Pulmenary Surgery. So there's another Wilson in Surgery (as Time says, no kin: There's a nepotism law in this here state).

On the plus side is Frederick J. Bonte (M. D. Western Reserve, Assistant Professor, University Hospital of Cleveland until 7-1-56), who arrived a few weeks ago to become Professor of Radiology and Head of the Department and to become Radiologist in charge at Parkland.

Also in Surgery, in the field of Neurosurgery, comes W. K. Clark (M.D. University of Texas Medical Branch), with the title of Assistant Professor and Chair man of the Division, who will carry on experimental work in Neurosurgery as well as assuming a considerable clinical duty.

Again in Surgery, or have we mentioned this before?, arrived Charles F. Gregory (M. D. Indiana School of Medicine), with the title Associate Professor, who will have chairmanship of the division of Orthopedic Surgery.

The Department of Pediatrics adds another to its faculty in the person of
John A. James, Assistant Professor (M.BCh.B. Edinburgh). Dr. James'special interest is in nephrosis.

ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE COMPLETES ITS DIRTY WORK

The Admissions Committee, with a new face or two and with a fierce desire to remain as anonymous as possible, completed its task of naming a hundred to this year's Freshman class and selecting twenty alternates from a field of 400

plus. Among heartening signs this year . Caritton B. Chapman (M. D. Harvard) were a number of first-rate applicants who either listed Southwestern preferentially or applied to no other school. A rather larger number than usual come from Rice and University of Texas. number of applicants who didn't make our alternate list have been accepted by other schools. We're not bragging, but anyhow the word may be getting around a bit.

INTERNSHIPS

Parkland this year has a remarkably variegated group with many very goodlooking fellows from various schools in the South, notably Emory, Tulane, University of Alabama and Duke.

The Class of 1956 has obtained about its usual distribution of internships in and out of the state. There is a strong tendency to choose internships in private hospitals where the pay is good and the hours are short in spite of attempts by a committee last fall to indoctrinate the class in the characteristics of good places. Miss Rucker is carrying on a continuing solicitation of information from each class as to the quality of instruction wherever graduates go. It's through no lack of information or misinformation or failure to obtain desirable places that some of our people land in places where they oughtn't to be.
