

Dr. Leake Opens Medical Drive

"A great chance to take the leadership in medical education and scientific research is being afforded the Southwest by the activities of the Southwestern Medical Foundation and the opportunities to come from the great new Medical Center to be built here" said Dr. Chauncey D. Leake head of the University of Texas Medical School, Galveston at the luncheon, Hotel Adolphus on October 18, opening the Southwestern Medical Foundation president, Dr. Leake stated that "unfettered by involved prejudice, uninhibited by outmoded traditional or foolish fear, and confident in its energetic leadership, the Suthwestern Medical Foundation has an unparalled opportunity to develop the finest kind of health leadership in the Southwest.

"The University of Texas Medical School extends full cooperation to the Foundation and its College to join enthusiastically in the common attempt to make the Southwest the center of progressive health activity that it deserves to be," Dr. Leake declared.

When the entire building program of the proposed new Medical Center is completed Dallas, and the entire Southwest, will have a medical center comparable to the largest and finest in the North and East.

their individual quotas be raised.

Dr. Frank C. Selecman of the Doctors, Dentists and Public Helath Group, reported his committee had raised \$85,000 on a quota of \$65,000, and asked that a new quota of \$100,000 be set for the group.

W. B. Wright, head of the Drug and Medical Suppliers Division, reported returns of \$20,000 on a quota of \$18,000, and asked that their quota be increased to \$25,000.

"The Southwestern Medical Foundation is in a peculiarly strategic position for utilizing federal support for medical education and research to the advantage in this vicinity," Dr. Leake stated, in discussing the federally-supported health education and research program now discussed by Congress.

Dr. Andrew Confers With Uruguayan Medics and Press

Dr. Warren Andrew, visiting professor and research worker in the field of geriatrics (old age) to the University of Montevideo, Uruguay from Southwestern Medical College, is pictured as he confers with doctors and Uruguayan press members shortly after his arrival.

The invitation was extended Dr. Andrew by Professor Dr. Julio Maria Sosa, director of the laboratory for histological research at the University of Montevideo, in recognition of the strides he has made in the study of geiatrics, or old age.

While at the University, Dr. Andrew will familiarize himself with the advancements in the technique of staining body tissues for observation on glass slides. "Dyes are more extensively used in this country for staining body tissues," Dr. Andrews explained, "although metallic impregnation of tissues using silver and gold salts is a far more successful method as the tissues can be more clearly observed."

Andrew will introduce advancements in this field at Southwestern Medical College when he returns.
