DALLAS--Volunteer medical students at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School have recently published the third edition of a guide to current nonmedical drug use.

The guide, which was originally published in 1970 by students at the Dallas medical school who established Tuatara, a medical-legal information center, has been widely used at the volunteer service agency, in free clinics around the country, and by youth and school workers, as well as by young people themselves, according to Dr. Jim Waltner, Southwestern graduate and one of the founders of Tuatara.

Tuatara furnishes accurate information about drugs and related health and legal problems as well as acting as a referral center, Waltner said.

"The guide has proved to be extremely helpful in getting information on drugs quickly and accurately," he commented.

The publication, "Current Nonmedical Drug Use: A Guide" is available from Tuatara, 3520 Cedar Springs (528-1511), for \$1.00 per copy to cover cost of printing and mailing, Waltner said.

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
