*****Kidney researcher, Dr. Robert Schrier, named Winans Visiting Professor at UTHSCD.

DALLAS--Dr. Robert Schrier, noted researcher of kidney disease, has been announced the Winans Visiting Professor of Medicine at The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas Dec. 11-15. Dr. Schrier, chairman of the Department of Medicine at University of Colorado Medical Center, will lecture on "Acute renal failure--pathogenesis, diagnosis and treatment" at 11 a.m., Dec. 14.

Dr. Schrier has served as head of the Division of Renal Diseases at the Colorado medical center. He has had faculty appointments in the Renal Division and in the Cardiovascular Research Institute of the University of California Medical Center, San Francisco. Following a residency at University of Washington School of Medicine, he received training at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, Boston; Charing Cross Hospital Medical School, London; and Walter Reed Army Institute of Research, Washington, D.C.

Also the author of the book "Pathophysiology of Renal and Electrolyte Disorders," he serves on numerous committees including the National Institutes of Health Hypertension Task Force and the Committee on Nephrology of the American Board of Internal Medicine. He chairs the National Kidney Foundation Research and Grants Committee.

Traditionally, the Winans visiting professor is a distinguished clinical scholar invited to conduct rounds and exchange ideas with faculty, students and house staff members at the health science center. Funds are provided by the Southwestern Medical Foundation from the income for its Henry M. Winans Fund, established in 1966 by friends and patients of the late Dr. Winans, who was chairman of the UTHSCD Department of Internal Medicine and chief of medicine at Baylor University Medical Center.
