1965 AND BEYOND

The holiday season brings the end of a truly outstanding year in the history of Southwestern. Our school has begun its march into the front ranks of American medical institutions.

The specifics are easy to detail. What is harder to describe is the enthusiasm, the sense of achieving that permeates the campus. In a quiet and confident manner Southwestern looks forward to the future.

Some of the reasons for the "new look":

- Our fourth year students came out exceptionally well on the National Board exams. This must reflect both an improved quality of our student body and a more successful teaching program.
- Our faculty continues to grow in an amazing manner. It is obvious that Southwestern now competes favorably with any medical school for top-notch teachers.
- Our physical plant has grown impressively, but the plans for our immediate future are truly amazing. Already or soon to be completed are the following: (1) The Skillern Student Center. (3) The Danciger Clinical Research Building. (3) A \$7.5 million "renewal" of Parkland Hospital, including complete air-conditioning, addition of three more floors plus expansion of the South wing and more parking space. (4) The Children's Medical Center, a \$4 million, 300 plus bed complex being built just behind Parkland. (5) The Presbyterian Hospital to be opened in early 1966. Though not on the campus, a close relationship with the School will provide an important addition to the clinical and teaching facilities.

All this looks great, but look at what the future holds: (1) A \$4 million library building. (2) A \$4 million basic science building. (Planning for both of these has been approved by the Regents.) (3) An auditorium building. (4) New separate animal quarters. (5) Additional parking spaces. (These and other improvements are being planned after authorization of a Site-Plan by the Regents.) (6) A new \$3.5 million TWU College of Nursing complex to be built on the campus near Inwood Road. (7) And even more to come at Parkland.
