DALLAS--Dr. Maxwell M. Wintrobe, a widely noted blood specialist and internist, will deliver the annual Gifford-Hill lecture for The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School here Thursday.

Dr. Wintrobe will speak on "A Biography of the Red Cell" at 11 a.m. in the Staff Library at Parkland Memorial Hospital. The Utah-based physician has been at the medical school this week as visiting professor, conducting ward rounds and seminars with students and staff and consulting with faculty researchers.

The lectureship is made possible each year through a grant to the UTSWMS Department of Medicine by the Gifford-Hill companies.

Dr. Wintrobe serves as Distinguished Professor of Internal Medicine at The University of Utah Medical Center in Salt Lake. He is director of the Cardiovascular Research and Training Institute for the University of Utah.

He has authored more than 350 scientific articles, chiefly on the blood. He is the author of "Clinical Hematology," a textbook published by Lea & Febiger of Philadelphia; co-editor and editor-in-chief of a number of editions of "Harrison's Principles of Internal Medicine," published by McGraw Hill.

Dr. Wintrobe is recipient of the Modern Medicine Award for Distinguished Achievement and is listed in Who's Who in America and Outstanding Educators of America.

Dr. Wintrobe received B.A., M.D., and B.Sc. degrees from the University of Manitoba and took a Ph.D. from Tulane University. He has been on the faculty at Tulane and Johns Hopkins University.

Widely sought as a visiting professor and lecturer, Dr. Wintrobe has traveled around the world and has fulfilled a great number of assignments on medical and advisory committees.

He is chairman of Panel 15 and a member of the Executive Committee,

Committee on Research in the Life Sciences, Committee on Sciences and

Public Policy, National Academy of Sciences, in addition to other appointments held with the NAS.
