NEWSPAPER EDITOR NAMED VICE PRESIDENT FOR PUBLIC AFFAIRS

DALLAS -- Roy E. Bode has been named vice president for public affairs at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas, effective May 1.

Bode was editor of the Dallas Times Herald when the daily newspaper ceased operation in December 1991. As the paper's chief editorial executive since mid-1988, he was responsible for the editorial page as well as the news operation.

As vice president for public affairs at UT

Southwestern, he will be responsible for efforts to make
the public more aware of the medical center's research,
educational and clinical accomplishments, both locally
and nationally.

Oklahoma, Kentucky and New Jersey. In 1977 he joined the Times

Herald as Washington bureau chief, returning to Dallas later to

serve as state and regional editor, assistant managing editor for

news and associate editor before assuming the editor's office.

"My wife, Ellen, and I have always tried to contribute to our community," Bode said. "UT Southwestern is vitally important to the future of Dallas, and I feel I can make a significant contribution here."

Bode has won numerous journalism awards and was part of a team that won the George K. Polk Award, one of the profession's highest honors, for a series on black and Hispanic civil rights in Texas.
