DALLAS--Dr. T.K. Murray, chief of the nutrition research division of the Canadian department of national health and welfare's health protection branch, will be visiting lecturer for a Dallas meeting Dec. 1 and 2.

Dr. Murray will give the key address at the twelfth annual post-graduate course for dietitians, sponsored by The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas. The meeting, which will bring together professionals in nutrition and dietetics from many states, will be held at the Baker Hotel.

Dr. Murray's topics will be "Nutrition Canada--A National Survey" and "Nutritional Research: Does It Meet Our Needs?"

The governmental division he heads is responsible for all of the biochemical analyses of samples from participants in the Canadian national nutrition survey. The researcher is an international authority on vitamin A nutriture.

Other addresses will be given by University of Texas Health Science Center faculty at Dallas. They include the following:

"Problems of the Esophagus," Dr. Richard P. Norgaard, clinical instructor in internal medicine, Southwestern Medical School.

"Diverticula of the Colon," Dr. Ivan Danhof, associate professor of physiology, Southwestern Medical School.

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"Trace Elements in the Human Environment," Dr. Donald S. Wiggans, professor of biochemistry and professor of nutrition and dietetics, School of Allied Health Sciences.

"Caloric Equivalents of Work," Dr. Carl Gunnar Blomqvist, assistant professor of internal medicine, Southwestern Medical School.

"Technology and Food," Dr. John S. Chapman, assistant dean for postgraduate education, Southwestern Medical School.

"Nutrition Services in Children and Youth, Maternal and Infant Care and Family Planning Projects," Dr. Peggy C. Fry, assistant professor of pediatrics, Southwestern Medical School.

Also speaking on the latter topic will be Mrs. Victoria Bowie, R.D., M.S., nutrition coordinator, Houston health department.
