**Dr. Charles and Peggy Galvin give \$100,000 to establish professorship in physical medicine at UT Southwestern**

DALLAS – Aug. 22, 2006 – Dallas civic leaders Dr. Charles and Peggy Galvin have donated \$100,000 to establish a professorship in physical medicine at UT Southwestern Medical Center.

The gift, given to Southwestern Medical Foundation, will create the Charles and Peggy Galvin Professorship in Physical Medicine, which will emphasize research investigating the causes, prevention and treatment of pressure ulcers.

“Peggy and I have a lot of respect for UT Southwestern, and we recognize what enormous contributions the medical center gives to the people of Dallas,” said Dr. Galvin, former dean of Southern Methodist University’s Dedman School of Law. “We’re glad to have the opportunity to support its physical medicine programs in this way and look forward to watching the research unfold.”

Dr. Galvin holds a bachelor’s degree from SMU, a master’s and law degree from Northwestern University, and a doctor of juridical science degree from Harvard Law School. He was on the faculty of the Dedman School of Law for 30 years, serving as dean for 15 years. He also served on the faculty of Vanderbilt School of Law for more than a decade and has been a visiting professor at numerous elite law schools across the country. He is currently of counsel to the Dallas law firm of Haynes and Boone, LLP.

Dr. Galvin has received many awards and honors, including being named a distinguished alumnus by SMU and an alumnus of merit by Northwestern. At UT Southwestern, he and his wife are longtime members of the President’s Research Council.

Mrs. Galvin, who holds a bachelor’s degree from Brooklyn College and a master’s degree from Northwestern, serves on the advisory board of Catholic Charities of Dallas, and is a lifetime trustee of the Notre Dame School of Dallas. She received the Bishop Tschoepe Award for her work as chair of the Dallas Diocesan Board of Education and was honored by Goodwill Industries for meritorious service and by the Child & Family Guidance Center for her services on the board and as

president. She served for many years on the board of the Women's Council of Dallas County.

The couple has five children.
