MONEY AND PLANS

On October 27, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, in expressing appreciation for the past performance of the medical school, awarded the school an additional THREE MILLION DOLLARS, bringing the total University allocations to over SIX MILLION. This will assist Southwestern greatly in moving ahead with the building program, but it is a mere beginning. The estimated cost of all projected building is nearly TWENTY MILLION.

By 1971, plans are to have a biomedical information center (combining the library with various computer and audio-visual services), a basic science research building, an administration building and postgraduate teaching center (combining administration, postgraduate teaching, an auditorium, cafeteria, and faculty lounge), a classroom and laboratory teaching building, and an animal care facility. In addition, the Cary building will be remodeled to provide more office and laboratory space for the clinical departments. A service building, student housing, and overall site development are also in the vital stages of *(Continued on Page 2)*

planning.

In meeting the challenge of medical education, research, and service, a medical school must have rational control over its destiny, and develop guidelines to assist those working within it to capitalize upon opportunities and to solve problems. Thus, a long-range master plan for The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School is being developed to meet changing needs in a changing society. A planning committee recently formed at Southwestern includes DR. TOM SHIRES, DR. DONALD SELDIN, DR. PARKHOUSE SHORE, DR. VERNIE STEM-BRIDGE, DR. ROBERT STUBBLEFIELD, DR. FRANK HARRISON, and ROCKWELL SCHULZ, new Associate Dean for Administrative and Hospital Affairs.

Board of Regents Approves Medical School Hospital Affiliations

In September the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS gave approval for a coordinated education, research and treatment program between SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL and METHODIST HOSPITAL, CHILDREN'S MED-ICAL CENTER, CALLIER SPEECH AND HEAR-ING CENTER and the DALLAS NEUROPSYCHI-ATRIC INSTITUTE.

A cardiopulmonary program for research, education and treatment, co-directed by DR. WILLIAM F. MILLER and DR. FOUAD A. BASHOUR of the Department of Internal Medicine, has been established in conjunction with METHODIST HOSPITAL. This program will emphasize improved methods of diagnosis and treatment of pulmonary and cardiac disease as well as evaluation of current methods. The education program will be directed at Dallas and North Texas physicians, medical students, interns and residents as well as paramedical personnel concerned with patient care.

CHILDREN'S MEDICAL CENTER will furnish the clinical facilities for a comprehensive care program for children under the direction of the faculty of Pediatrics of Southwestern. The program is supported by a U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare Children's Bureau grant.

CALLIER SPEECH AND HEARING CENTER will provide sixty weekly hours of qualified professional services to aid in a complete program of diagnosis, evaluation, and counseling, as well as education, research and the development of improved techniques for testing speech and hearing problems of the mentally retarded.

In 1965 the Texas Legislature appropriated \$250,-000 to the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation for planning and authorized construction of a DALLAS STATE NEUROPSYCHIATRIC IN-STITUTE, which will serve as a teaching facility for SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL. The University of Texas has agreed to deed about ten acres for construction of the Institute on the Southwestern Campus.

UT Board of Regents Approves New Basic Science Building

A new basic science research building at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School will bear the name of a prominent Dallas family, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene McDermott. Board approval came at a meeting of the University Board of Regents in Houston on December 7.

To be named the McDermott Basic Science Research Building, the structure is slated for completion by the latter part of 1970. Construction is scheduled to begin in the spring of 1969. George Dahl of Dallas is the architect.

In addition to the generous support of the Mc-Dermott family, appropriations for the facility include funds from the federal government and permanent funds from The University of Texas. The estimated cost of the structure is estimated at approximately \$5 million. Some 75,000 sq. ft. will be added to research space at Southwestern.

The basic science building is included in Phase I of a developmental program at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. In preliminary planning stages are a biochemical information center, an administration building and postgraduate teaching center, a classroom and laboratory teaching building, and an animal care facility. They are set for completion by 1971. At a recent meeting, the Board of Regents appropriated \$3½ million of permanent University funds for these other facilities. Matching funds, however, need to be obtained.
