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LEAD GIFTS FOR INNOVATIONS IN MEDICINE CAMPAIGN TOTAL MORE THAN \$172 MILLION

DALLAS – April 9, 2002 – UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas said today that more than \$172 million has already been committed toward its \$450 million Innovations in Medicine campaign, which will ensure UT Southwestern's leadership role in the new era brought about by the completion of the Human Genome Project.

"For UT Southwestern to remain in the forefront of the medical revolution, we must continue expanding the depth and breadth of our research and clinical programs," said UT Southwestern President Dr. Kern Wildenthal. "Our faculty leaders are focusing on ensuring that new genetic and molecular discoveries are rapidly applied to the practice of medicine.

"The campaign is off to an exceptionally strong start with a significant number of major lead gifts during the 'quiet phase' of the effort," Wildenthal said.

Major gifts to the campaign include four previously unannounced donations totaling more than \$64 million: a \$25 million distribution from a trust established by the Bulah M. Luse; \$20 million from the Howard Hughes Medical Institute; \$11.7 million from the Harry S. Moss Trust for the Prevention and Cure of Heart Disease; and \$7.5 million from Deborah and W.A. "Tex" Moncrief Jr.

Bulah "Lucy" MacAdams Luse died in 1981. She and her husband, W.P. Luse, a longtime Texas oilman, had lived in Dallas most of their lives. After Mr. Luse's death, Mrs. Luse provided in her will for the creation of the Jack L. Burrell Trust. Mrs. Luse stipulated that upon termination of the trust in 2001, a major portion of the corpus was to go to research at UT Southwestern. The trust, which was managed by Bank of America of Dallas, provided \$25,113,413 to UT Southwestern in September 2001.

"Although Bill Luse started working at the age of 12 in a furniture store, he and my aunt, who graduated from a Tennessee women's college just after the turn of the century, were strong believers in education," said Jack Burrell, who worked side-by-side with his uncle in the East Texas oil fields for many years.

The Howard Hughes Medical Institute has contributed \$20 million toward the

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construction of a new \$240 million research tower on UT Southwestern's North Campus. In 1986 UT Southwestern became the 12th academic medical center to house investigators from HHMI, headquartered in Chevy Chase, Md. The institute now supports the research of more than 300 of the nation's top biomedical scientists at 60 institutions. Twelve HHMI independent investigators are now based at UT Southwestern, where they lead programs involving more than 100 scientists, technicians and trainees, with an annual research budget of \$14 million.

The Harry S. Moss Trust for the Prevention and Cure of Heart Disease has made a 10-year, \$11.7 million grant to UT Southwestern to expand cardiovascular research. The grant will support projects in the Harry S. Moss Heart Center on the causes, prevention and treatment of cardiovascular diseases, and will enable the recruitment of additional heart researchers. The Moss Heart Center at UT Southwestern was created in 1973 by the Moss Heart Trust, which is administered by the Trust Department of Bank of America of Dallas.

Named for Harry S. Moss, a 45-year Dallas resident and president of Moss Petroleum Co., the trust was established after his death in 1970. In addition to the Moss Heart Center, the trust has previously provided funds for the Harry S. Moss Clinical Science Building and for several endowed chairs at UT Southwestern. It has also given grants to several Dallas hospitals affiliated with UT Southwestern, including a recent lead gift of \$240,000 to St. Paul University Hospital for new equipment used in the UT Southwestern/St. Paul Heart and Lung Transplantation Program.

"The Harry S. Moss Heart Center at UT Southwestern is recognized worldwide as a leader in research into cholesterol metabolism and cardiovascular disease and it has developed one of the most successful heart transplant programs in the country," said Daniel Kelly, vice president of Bank of America.

Deborah and W.A. "Tex" Moncrief have pledged \$7.5 million for a new Radiation Oncology Center in Dallas to complement the Moncrief Cancer Center in Fort Worth. The new \$15 million Moncrief facility will adjoin the Seay Biomedical Building and the Mary Nell and Ralph B. Rogers Magnetic Resonance Center. Planned for three stories and 40,000 square feet, it will house \$9 million in state-of-the-art radiation therapy and research equipment.

"I am very pleased at the prospect of having a cancer facility on the UT Southwestern campus in Dallas to interact with the UT Southwestern Moncrief Cancer Center in Fort Worth,"

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said Tex Moncrief. "I foresee great advances in cancer treatment and research in North Texas as a result of the plans for developing these collaborating centers in both communities."

Tex Moncrief, a Fort Worth oilman, has long-standing ties to UT Southwestern and the UT System, for which he served on the Board of Regents from 1987 to 1993. At UT Southwestern, the Moncriefs previously have provided support for a research center for cancer genetics, a distinguished chair in cholesterol and arteriosclerosis research, and an endowed scholar in medical science.

In addition to these four donations, UT Southwestern has already received more than 100 other gifts of \$100,000 or more during the quiet phase of the "Innovations in Medicine" campaign, which began in 2000.

"These magnificent lead gifts will help assure UT Southwestern's ongoing leadership in medical science," said Wildenthal. "They constitute a wonderful beginning for the Innovations in Medicine campaign that will allow us to remain at the forefront of medicine for decades to come."
