Dr. Fry takes Surgery chairmanship

The building of a strong Surgery Department on campus and cementing of relations with the medical community and the community of teaching hospitals will be among the major responsibilities facing Dr. William James Fry, a prominent vascular surgeon from Michigan, who has accepted the job as chairman of the medical school's Department of Surgery.

Dr. Fry, who has been holder of the Frederick A. Coller Professorship at the University of Michigan Medical School in Ann Arbor, takes the position vacated by Dr. G. Tom Shires in December, 1973. Dr. Fry is scheduled to assume his position on April 1.

Since the departure of Dr. Shires, Dr. Ronald Jones, professor of Surgery, has been acting chairman of the department.

"The school certainly owes a debt of gratitude to Dr. Jones in serving as chairman during this period," Dr. Frederick Bonte, Southwestern's dean, explain-

ed. "In his term, the graduating medical students placed first in Surgery in a national competitive examination."

In making their selection, the committee considered all of the prominent figures in American surgery and concluded that Dr. Fry was the man most suited to the needs of Southwestern.

"While the Department of Surgery enjoys an excellent reputation now, Dr. Fry's coming signals the beginning of an era of even greater achievements," Dr. Bonte commented.

Dr. Fry will be doing a substantial amount of recruiting nationwide to fill the vacant Surgery slots. As the new Surgery chairman, he automatically be-

comes chief of the Surgery Service at Parkland Hospital and assumes the Dr. Lee Hudson-Robert R. Penn Chair in Surgery.

He is current president of the Central Surgical Association and past-president of the Michigan Chapter, American College of Surgeons, and the Victor Vaughn Society. He has held several positions with the Coller Surgical Society and is a fellow of the American College of Surgeons.

Dr. Fry was head of the Section of General Surgery in the Surgery Department at the Michigan medical school from 1967 to 1974. He also has been chief of the Red Surgical Service there.

Dean Estabrook asks release of duties

Dr. Ronald Estabrook has asked to be relieved of responsibilities as dean of the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences as soon as a successor can be found, center president Dr. Charles Sprague has announced.

Dr. Estabrook has, for a considerable time, occupied two major administrative positions, one as graduate school dean and the other as Virginia Lazenby O'Hara Professor and chairman of the Department of Biochemistry.

Dr. Sprague said he has appointed a nine-member search committee to make recommendations for a new graduate school dean.

"I have directed that the new dean will hold only the one major administrative position," Dr. Sprague noted. "Dr. Estabrook certainly deserves great credit for shouldering the burdens of two full-time jobs through this period of growth

of our institution.

"He is to be particularly commended for his guidance of the graduate school in its formative years."

The search committee is chaired by Dr. Jonathan Uhr, chairman of Microbiology, and consists of Dr. Rupert Billingham, chairman of Cell Biology; Dr. Samuel McCann, chairman of Physiology; Dr. David Mishelevich, director of Medical Computing Resources Center; Dr. Mary Esther Gaulden, Freeman Professor of Radiology;

Dr. Paul Srere, professor of Biochemistry and Internal Medicine; Dr. Dan Foster, professor of Internal Medicine; Dr. William Pettinger, professor of Pharmacology; and Dr. John Shadduck, associate professor of Pathology and Comparative Medicine.

Dr. Estabrook will continue in his present position until a successor can be named.

A specialist in child psychiatry, he was formerly executive director of the Harvard Training Program in Child Psychiatry, and principal psychiatrist at the Massachusetts Mental Health Center and director of the center's adolescent unit

A member of numerous organizations, he was past-president of the Dallas Neuropsychiatric Society, past-secretary of the American Academy of Child Psychiatry, and had been secretary of the New Orleans Psychoanalytic Institute.

He is survived by his wife, three sons, a daughter and two grandchildren.

Committee reaffirms library rule

In its December meeting, the Library Committee unanimously reaffirmed a previously set policy concerning the abuse of borrowing privileges, and recommended immediate enforcement of suspension of borrowing privileges after a 30-day overdue period.

The new policy says borrowers with overdue materials will be penalized after a 30-day period, during which time they will receive several overdue notices and one warning of suspension notice. They will then be notified that borrowing privileges have been restricted until the materials are returned or paid for.

Although there are no overdue fees, payment for lost books will include charges to cover the cost of acquiring and processing replacements.

Council chooses officers



Dr. Ray Henke, who promises to keep his desk neater;


Bob Boudreaux, who says he will not order any more books;

Wildlife art draws N-M appeal

They say that clothes make the man -- but what about the man who makes the clothes? Or, as in Roland Castanie's case, let's consider the artist who creates the designs for the clothes — specifically, the designs featured on the "Best of Fall '75" men's sports collection at Neiman-Marcus.

A talented medical illustrator in Medical Illustration Services, Roland began combining his duck hunting and artistic interest two years ago and produced a variety of nature drawings initially centered around ducks and hunting scenes. As his interest in wildlife art grew and requests for other animal drawings mounted, Roland expanded his illustrations to include the bighorn sheep, eagle, wild goose and impala.

As a result, he entered some drawings in a Richardson art show in October, 1974, where they were spotted by a Neiman-Marcus buyer. Nine months later, they appeared on Neiman-Marcus' men's silk sports shirts and ties.

"I never thought it was all real until

it actually happened," he commented. "I'd only been doing the drawings for fun, but I didn't know it would turn into this."

The sportswear premiered last October at the downtown and Northpark stores in Dallas and the store in Fort Worth. The original artwork was also shown at the Northpark store, where Roland appeared and answered questions about his work.

Due to his knowledge of ducks and their habitats from his hunting background, Roland has found numerous subjects for his illustrations. He generally can recall, for example, a bird's wingspan in flight, but often uses stuffed models to get accurate details.

"I have a taxidermist friend who lets me look at other animal models," he said. "I think this has improved my drawings."

Counting the initial pencil work, each pen-and-ink illustration requires between 100 to 160 hours to complete. "Most of the time, it takes a number of strokes using the same fine point pen to get a portion as dark as it should be," he

noted. He usually works on six different illustrations at once "to keep from getting bored," he said.

Another outgrowth of his hobby has been the opportunity to speak to several sports clubs and school groups. While it's easy to describe his art interest to listeners, he finds it somewhat difficult to explain his attraction to hunting.

"Many people can't understand how I could study and draw a wild animal, then shoot it," he noted. "I still can't adequately explain it."

Presently he is introducing his fouryear-old daughter, Monique, to wildlife and their surroundings. Monique and Roland's wife, Peggy, often accompany him on his hunting expeditions.

"Hopefully Monique is learning to understand and appreciate nature," Roland said. "I hope others are also brought closer to nature through my drawings."

Center to have new landscaping

An extensive landscaping and irrigation project has been planned for the center in the upcoming months, involving relocation and addition of plants around the campus and expansion of the sprinkler system.

Seventeen landscapers responded to the initial bid request, including two from Colorado and South Dakota. Bids were handled through the Office of Planning Facilities and Construction of The University of Texas System. A decision by the Board of Regents should be reached shortly.

"The new landscaping involves removing and adding certain types of trees and shrubs as well as transferring various plants from one area of the campus to another," Ken McNeil, assistant director of the center's Physical Plant, said.

Plants included in the landscaping plans are cedar elm, holly, red and live oak, crepe myrtle and Southern magnolia.
