GIFT TO UT SOUTHWESTERN TO FUND RESEARCH IN NEUROLOGICAL DISEASE DALLAS — October 18, 1994 — Judge David G. Fox, whose construction business provided thousands of area residents with new homes, now is doing his part to help build The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas into a world leader in neurological research. Fox and his wife, Mary Ellen, have donated \$250,000 to Southwestern Medical Foundation to fund studies at the medical center.

The gift will be matched by Southwestern Medical Foundation and will establish the David G. and Mary Ellen Fox Fund for Research in Neurological Diseases.

"Mary and I have been aware of all that has been accomplished at UT Southwestern, and it seemed appropriate to give our support," said Fox, a former county judge and president of Fox & Jacobs home builders. "We hope this will help people out."
