THE ROLE OF THE STUDENT RESEARCH FORUM

The function of the annual Student Research Forum at Southwestern is twofold: to recognize meritorious research by students and to serve as a means of informing the student body of the value of research experience as a component of modern medical education. The first function speaks for itself; it is the latter purpose which every student should consider seriously.

The dilemma of medical education today is not just how present medical knowledge can be reviewed and condensed for the student so as to insure maximum competence at the time of graduation. A more pressing problem is how to prepare students for careers in a rapidly changing discipline where obsolescence within a few years of graduation is inevitable unless the individual is intellectually equipped to keep up with the ever accelerating rate of change in medical knowledge. Many of us feel that one answer to this problem is in research as a part of the student's curriculum.

The advantage of such experience transcends the simple acquisition of specific scientific knowledge. Indeed, it is the nature of research that many of the best planned experiments do not work out no matter how clever and industrious the investigator may be. The specific knowledge derived from the research project may rapidly become obsolete. It is rather as a generator of habits of critical inquiry and intellectual excitement that investigation exerts its most important educational function. The student learns how to come to grips with a problem of the unknown. He learns how to evaluate results, to ask answerable questions. to design proper controls, to use statistics as a means of distinguishing warranted assertions from fancy. In short, he develops a familiarity with the methodology of modern medical research that cannot be acquired in any other way. As a consequence, he is better prepared to read critically the results of others and to

discipline himself in the difficult task of continuing self-education after the formal training of medicine is completed. These very real and pertinent advantages are independent of the type of career planned in medicine. A very strong argument can be made that a practitioner of medicine is likely to be a better doctor as the result of a preceptorship in an investigative laboratory.

The Student Research Forum admirably publicizes the many and diverse research opportunities open to those students who want to share in this exciting educational opportunity.

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ANATOMY DEPT. PLANS

Some of the development plans in the Dept. of Anatomy have been announced by Dr. William D. Willis, Jr., Chairman of the Department.

Functioning as a part of the Department beginning in September will be a Division of Biophysics. As a result, several hours of lecture will be added to the freshman Medical Physics course.

New to the Anatomy Department this year is Dr. Godfrey C. Hoskins who is teaching the freshman microanatomy course. Dr. Hoskins received his M.D. from SMS, and has engaged in research at King's College of the University of London, and Karolinska Institute for Cell Research and Genetics at Stockholm, Sweden.

The department recently acquired a Phillips EM-200 electron microscope for use in the tissue culture division in the soon to be completed Danciger Building.

Dr. Willis, chairman of the Anatomy Dept. since September of this year, received his B.S. and B.A. degrees from Texas A&M in 1956, an M.D. from SMS in 1960, and a Ph.D. from Australian National University in 1963. He has held a postdoctoral research fellowship in Australia under Sir John Eccles, and at the University of Pisa, Italy, under Professor G. Maruzzi, Instituto di Fisiologia.

DR. PANNILL TO HEAD NEW SCHOOL

The University of Texas has announced the appointment of Dr. F. C. Pannill as "Interim Dean" of South Texas Medical School in San Antonio on January 1, 1965. Dr. Pannill stated that this re-assignment of duties will require that he spend most of his time in San Antonio for the next few months, but that he hoped to resume his full-time activies here next fall.

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CHILDREN'S MEDICAL CENTER

The Children's Medical Center "Stake-Out" ceremonies were held Sunday, December 6th, at 3:30 p.m. at the site of their new hospital.
