

REUNION 1965 HONORING CLASSES OF '45 and '55

In the pattern of other years the Annual Meeting of the Dallas Southern Clinical Society served as occasion for the annual reunion of Southwestern graduates. The One and Two-Decade Doctors this year came from the classes of 1945 and 1955. 1945 is not very long ago, but World War II was not quite over, the A-bomb had not yet landed on Hiroshima, and there was no H-bomb, not yet a Korean War and not a single piece of hardware in orbit. Put another way, in 1945 penicillin had just become available for civilian use and all the rest of the antibiotics were unknown. It sounds like the Dark Ages, but who knows what Ages the future may designate as Dark?

The highlights of the evening were the reports on activities of the two classes meeting in reunion, the 1945 class presented by Dr. Roy Sheffield of Lubbock, the 1955 class presented by Dr. Kerfoot P. Walker of Tyler.

Amidst the eating, talking and dancing a brief business meeting of the Alumni Association was conducted by President Robert Bone. The constitution was amended to provide for six trustees, each serving for three years. The donation made by the Alumni Association to the Student Scholarship Fund was put on a permanent annual basis and \$1,000.00 was appropriated for 1965.

Approval by the Board of Trustees of a project for the Alumni Association to raise money for construction of an auditorium at the school was announced. A separate trust fund has been established to insure that all such money contributed for the advancement of the school will be tax-exempt.

Other actions taken by the Board of Trustees were included in the report of the Secretary-Treasurer, Dr. Norman M. Kaplan. These included a decision to leave the annual dues at \$5.00 and to limit the assessment for future dinnerdances to \$15.00 per couple, with any additional costs to be met by the Association.

Successor to Dr. Lackey as Chairman of the Department of Physiology will be Dr. S. M. McCann, who took his undergraduate work at the University of Pennsylvania. After residency at Massachusetts General and wartime service he entered the Department of Physiology at his medical alma mater and has continued in that department until the present. His area of research is in endocrinology and metabolism and his bibliography includes some 70 papers.
