For putting on both of these outstanding affairs, our special thanks go to our new Executive Secretary, Mrs. Louise B. Hipp, who is mainly responsible for the "new look" of our Association and we're delighted to have her with us.

Alumni Awards Seven Scholarships

During 1966, the Alumni awarded \$1,750.00 in Scholarships to seven students, chosen by the Assistant Dean for Student Affairs on the basis of scholastic achievement and need. Faculty in the News

1967 Marchman Award Winner

DR. JOHN S. CHAPMAN, Assistant Dean and Professor of Internal Medicine, was chosen for the Marchman Award presented by the Dallas Southern Clinical Society each year at its annual meeting. The Marchman Award, created in 1941, is bestowed on a Dallas physician "who has merited recognition for outstanding research or contribution to the advancement of medicine." Dr. Chapman, immediate past President of the American Thoracic Society, and Past President of the Dallas Area Tuberculosis Association, also serves as Area Consultant to the V. A. Hospital System. Dr. Chapman has contributed more than 75 publications to scientific literature. Long interested in the Alumni program, he has served as Faculty Advisor for many years and edited the "Sou'wester" until recent months.

Stembridge Presented Top Award

DR. VERNIE A. STEMBRIDGE, Professor of Pathology, was recently chosen for the coveted Caldwell Award by the Texas Society of Pathologists. The award is named for the late Dr. George T. Caldwell, prominent Texas pathologist, and is the highest honor bestowed by the state organization. Dr. Stembridge joined the faculty in 1959, advanced to full professor in 1961 and was recently named Chairman of the Department.

Piper Foundation Award

DR. HAL T. WEATHERSBY, Associate Professor of Anatomy was recently chosen from among the ranks of college and university faculties in Texas as one of the ten PIPER PROFESSORS. The Piper Award is in recognition of teaching excellence and other forms of scholarly achievement. Dr. Weathersby came to Southwestern in 1953 from Tulane.

Alumni Day Activities

A new twist to the annual reunion and dinner-dance was added this year. On Sunday afternoon, March 12, a special assembly and tour of the School was held for Alumni. DEAN GILL gave a sparkling summary of the amazing progress of our School, starting with the faculty of 16 in 1943 holding classes in the prefab barracks between Old Parkland and the railroad tracks to the present faculty of 197 with property valued at over \$15 MILLION.

Thereafter, a tour of the School was conducted by

SAMA representatives, featuring the research laboratories of the clinical departments.

At the evening banquet, DR. FRANK HARRISON presented a plaque to DR. A. J. GILL on behalf of the Alumni. The plaque was inscribed: "To Atticus James Gill, M.D. whose stabilizing influence and leadership as Dean, 1955-1967 was a major contribution to the rapid growth of the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School, with grateful appreciation from the Alumni."

THE BUILDING PROGRAM

There continues to be a great deal of interest in the developing building program for the medical school. As most of you will remember, the Basic Science Building (the Edward H. Cary Basic Science Hall) was completed in 1955, the Clinical Science Building (the Karl Hoblitzelle Clinical Science Center) was completed in 1958, and the Dan Danciger Research Center (which establishes the final link between the medical school and Parkland Hospital) was occupied in 1965. While these basic structures have provided the essential permanent space for the developing medical school, the rapid expansion of programs and personnel have made it increasingly necessary to add still more. Perhaps the greatest and most urgent need at the present time is further office and laboratory space for the expanding basic science faculty. While this need is of first priority and very urgent, it should be pointed out that certain of the clinical departments are already greatly crowded and in need of larger facilities.

A new department, Neurology, was organized in 1966 and became operational on July 1 with the arrival of Dr. David Daly, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Neurology.

In order to plan for the expanding requirements, a faculty committee has been working for many months with the consulting architects on the basic plans for a new building, tentatively designated as the Basic Science Laboratory Building. Simultaneously, another faculty committee has reached advanced planning stages for the new library building, to be known as the Fred Florence Biomedical Information Center.

In the long-range planning for the development of the Medical Center site it has also been realized that expansion of student teaching facilities will soon be necessary, as increases in enrollment seem to be inevitable. The consulting architects have prepared a long-range site plan which includes, in addition to the specific buildings mentioned above, an Administration Building, a Student Teaching Building, a Graduate Center which will include an auditorium and other related facilities, and extensive remodeling of large segments of the present Basic Science Building. At some time in the evolution of the Medical Center, major additional parking facilities will be required.

The site plan committee has long recommended a student housing program and this should be a project for the near future. In many respects it may be possible to move more rapidly in this area since it is quite likely that financing for student housing would be more quickly available than for certain other aspects of the developmental plan.

The Skillern Student Union has proved to be a most welcome addition to the Medical Center. The building is extensively used and fills a long-felt need. One of our great deficiencies continues to be adequate food service for the Medical Center and efforts are being made to plan a more effective means to provide

essential food services.

Much has been done, but much remains to be done.

The strong support of Central Administration and the Board of Regents made it possible to foresee a sequence of carefully planned physical plant additions which will go far toward enabling us to realize our desire to be among the outstanding medical institutions.
